Throughout this journal we use words such as magic, spells, esoteric, occult, and so on. Prefacing this word use, we would like to cite an entry on the use of the term 'witchcraft' which has been foundational to our approach. Our focus is different, but the sentiment parallels the one below:

The term WITCHCRAFT is an insulting generalization of diverse practices that habitate the realms of the epistemological, metaphysical, technological, and cultural. In this project, the term WITCHCRAFT will

be appropriated to complexify what it should stand for, i.e. divinatory, medical, magical practices and all sorts of practices that manifest within the supernatural, occult, shamanism, spiritualism, and other umbrella nomenclature determined by men of religion and anthropology, who couldn't grasp the reason and rational of such phenomena. The term will be used despite or even especially because of its connotations, so at to liberate these practices from the term and liberate them from the SAVAGE SLOT they have been forced into.<sup>1</sup>

Lastly, we want to thank Felix Meritis for including our issue launch in their online programming on June 11 2021.
